Dear Professor Goldziher:

I thank you most heartily for the portrait of yourself you have sent me, and the beautiful words you wrote on the margin. I will treasure it as one of the greatest gifts I have ever received and it will (when framed) soon adorn my office in the Seminary, where I have already some of the greatest men of Israel presented in photograph.

And now allow me to approach you in a matter which I have very much at heart. In a conversation with Mr. Kohut I received the impression that you would not be disinclined altogether to accept an invitation to this country with the object of delivering a course of lectures on Jewish philosophy. I do not know how far my impression was justified, but I hope you will not resent if I put this question to you, whether there is any hope for your accepting such an invitation. I am very anxious for it, both for the sake of the lecturer, whom I revere and admire and whose proximity for some longer time would become a source of unique joy and instruction for me; and for the sake of the subject, which was badly neglected and ignored till now. You are the only scholar who both would and could do it proper justice.

I do realize the difficulties connected with such an invitation, both on your part as well as on ours; since we ought to provide the means that your visit to this country should become a pleasure to you. And I am not even quite sure how far I shall succeed, but I think there is a good deal of hope that I may be able to realize my plan. I would set to work with a will if I could know that
