My Dear Colleague:

The rabbis of America, perhaps not without reason, have been repeatedly reproached with having contributed little in the active pursuit of Jewish literature and its diffusion among the masses. And yet American Judaism should claim, not only through numerical strength and widespread philanthropic energy, to lead the van in literary diffusion too. The epoch-making "Jewish Encyclopedia" with its enormous accumulation of material, may well serve as the first stone to an edifice of knowledge of Judaism among English-speaking people all over the world.

Around this corner-stone, it is now proposed to lay—and mainly by the energies of the American rabbis—another course, by the compilation and distribution of a "History of the Jewish People" in readable form for the general public; not as a scientific or technical work, but in the shape of separate chapters or essays (monographs), describing in popular style, the social, religious, literary and political life of the Jewish people in all ages and in all lands. Lord Acton's Cambridge "Modern History," now publishing, is an illustrious exemplar of this mode of treatment.

Will you aid us (a) by contributing such articles as may be assigned to you (at the rate of \$5 per 1000 words) and (b) by bringing this publication to the notice of your people and securing their subscriptions, saying "a good word in season" as to the desirability of spreading an intimate and authoritative knowledge of our people among Jews and Christians alike. The "Jewish Encyclopedia" has about 10,000 subscribers among English-reading people; the "History of the Jews in Monographs" should easily surpass this number, appealing as it does to a more popular and less technical taste.
