I have been reading with much interest the two articles of yours which you so kindly sent me. The one regarding the "Kämpfe um die Stellung des Hadit im Islam" touches upon several matters with which I have lately been interested. This use of the Jewish rabbinical law as a warning example, demonstrated by you, is something quite new to me, and it is

certainly an instructive fact. The similarity, in manner of development, between Islam and Judaism, and between Islam and Christianity, is very close in a great many ways. I have recently been tracing afresh some of the details of it, in preparation for a few lectures on Mohammedanism which I am to give at Harvard University in July.

I hear that you are coming to this country in the latter part of the year. The news interests me very much indeed, and I shall look forward to

seeing as much of you as may be possible. Unfortunately, Yale University is not one of the subscribers to the fund for that course of lectures; nevertheless, I am sure that you will come to New Haven, and in that case I shall want you to make your home with me, as long as you can stay.
