Dear Professor Lukacs,

I am writing to you for two purposes. The first is to ask whether, if this University were to invite you to visit to England either to lecture to us or merely to pay a visit, you would be favourably disposed to accept, given satisfactory conditions for the offer. I do not know whether you have visited England before, but I can assure you such visit would be considered an immense compliment to this University and would attract much interest from the many people who have followed your work with the greatest admiration and enlightenment.

Second, I am most surprised that your famous work Geschichte und Klassenbewusstsein has remained untranslated into English, particularly now that there is a French edition (Histoire et Conscience de Classe, Editions de Minuit). As I understand it, Martin Ede of Merlin Press has the rights of translation of your work in Britain, but is unable to undertake this translation. Whatever the political controversy that may in the past have surrounded this work, it seems its fundamental insights in many respects should not be denied an English audience. I wonder what you feel about this
