Dear Professor Lucacs:

We are planning to bring out a special issue of our journal, Nineteenth-Century Fiction, with which you may be familiar, for the observation of the Charles Dickens Centennial in 1970. Could you send us an essay of any length on any aspect of Dickens? If you prefer to write it in German, we shall be happy to publish it in German or to have it translated and submitted to you for approval—whichever you prefer. We plan the issue for the spring of 1970 and so should have the essay by October of this year, if that is possible.

I don't know if you have happened to see my survey of Dickens scholarship and criticism in the volume Victorian Fiction: A Guide to Research, ed. Lionel Stevenson, published by Harvard University Press in 1964, in which I make some comment on your excellent work in the field of the novel. If you do not have a personal copy of this work (of interest of course for the essays on all the other Victorian authors) it would give me great pleasure to send you a copy with my compliments.

I cannot tell you how happy and proud you would make the editors of <u>Nineteenth-Century Fiction</u> and me personally if you find it possible to accept our invitation to contribute to the Dickens special issue.
