Dear Sir,



In answer to your favour
of the 16th inst., I regret not
to be able to transmit to
you Dr. Goldziders Mj. for
the simple reason, that
I never received it. Dr. G.
left the Mj. in the hands
of a friend of his, Mr. L.
Felbermann, with in=
structions to send it to
me. Mr. Felbermann did

so - at least, I think he did -
but the M^y. was nicely
wrapped in a common
news-paper wrapper, and
all what I received was
the empty wrapper!

Fortunately I was at home,
when the wrapper arrived,
and suspecting that it
had contained something
important, I paid the
extra. charge demanded
for the empty-wrapper.
(it was marked 'over four
ounces, 2^d W. S. D.') and I took
the acknowledgment of the
post-man that it had
been delivered to me

without contents. After
a time I received from D^r.
G. and simultaneously from
Mr. Felbermann letters,
asking me to return the
