My dear Professor Goldziker

About six weeks ago Mrs Gotthail com-
menced a letter to you, which she has since then
been unable to finish. She has - I am sorry to
say - been very ill all winter, and has just gone
through two very painful Surgical operations. I
am glad to say that she is doing very well under
the circumstances - but she has suffered greatly,
in mind as well as in body. She is very much
run down and I look forward to the summer
with much concern. She is just now able to
hold up her head in bed; and the first letter
the doctor allowed her to receive was yours

which came to-day, you can well imagine how much it delighted and refreshed her.

Our plans for the summer are somewhat deranged. We had intended stopping on this side of the water. But the doctor demands a complete change and a complete rest. We have taken passage for June 13th for Havre; if only Mrs. Ethelred is then in a condition to travel. It is our intention to go straight to Switzerland with the least possible delay, I have selected a place called Heiden not far from Rorschach and the lake of Constance for the first part of our stay, and probably Engelberg for the second (near Lucern). It would seem that Heiden is not so far removed from Munich; and our hope is that you may again be at Nitzing,

and that there may be some way devised of getting a sight of you.

I am very much obliged to you for your latest volumes, which I have received a day or two ago, and which I have already worked almost through. It has been most instructive, and I can only wish I had not had it sooner, when I was preparing an article on Arabic Literature for the new "Encyclopedia of the World's Best Literature". You are perfectly right in what you say regarding the title. I wish you had left out the paper on the Turkish, and had inserted in its place some of your many articles on Arabic Poetry. The whole would then have been more "Einheitlich", and you could have given it the title "Studies in Arabic Literature".

But we are so glad to have anything from you,
no matter what its title!

I have just added some 30 more Hebrew
Mss. to our collection, which must now number
about 300. We have also a few Arabic, Turkish
and Persian Mss.
