Dear Sir

I have to answer your letter of the 23rd Oct, which reached me abroad, & your post Card of the 6th inst. on the subject of a translation of your 'Vorlesungen' - yesterday the Trustees met, & you will no doubt, receive a formal intimation of what took place on the subject. Subsequently to my last letter to you, ~~wrote~~ my two remaining Colleagues sent answers to my proposal, on the whole very favourable - One of them indeed said that, in his view, to publish translations of works by European, as distinct from Oriental writers, was not within the province of the Trust;

- a view quite erroneous, & which
would result in including works by
Jurje Laidan, whilst excluding your
own - Comment on such a result is
superfluous

I therefore felt that I could not at
the meeting, propose a foundation with
the slightest prospect of success & I
did not make the attempt I did,
however, make enquiry of Prof. Brown,
just as he was leaving, & he told me
that he has received your book & also
a letter, but dealing with other matters.

You will, therefore, rest assured
that 'disharmony', whether or not

present, in fact, in the 'Comite' Gitt,
did not make its entry on this occasion.

At Berlin I found your work had
lately reached Scholars' hands, & they
spoke much of it. I was struck with
their number & activity compared with
what either England or France can
show. At Hamburg I saw also Prof.

Becker, whom I had hitherto known
only in Correspondence. I found him
just what I expected.
