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Budapest March 16<sup>th</sup> 1909

My dear MacDonald, many thanks for your kind and so instructive letter of 25/II. Your remarks about Nablus are striking of interest and I cannot but envy you for your experiences there. Never I had thought that a Nablus-sherif would have a friendly interview with a Christian divine. But was he a *pious*? Do you remember? The Muslim fanaticism is a very strange matter. It will not hurt the humanity and the traditional duty of *islam*. *This* looks good for an Arab (not for a Persian); he will never forget the great principle (جیل علیہ الرحمۃ) His religious fanaticism will attain other objects; heretic Muslims etc. living in Egypt and Syria (Demasius was then renowned for the fanaticism of the common people) I never experienced fanatic outbreaks of Muslim people against myself, although they knew that I belong to the *qadis*; and I had so many friends among theologians and laymen. Now, with few exceptions, all left this world of frailty since that long time!

I read your Lectures with much pleasure! although there are many points where I cannot ~~partake~~ share your point de vue. In all, it is a masterly conceived and written book. I will try to review it in the Revue de l'Historie des Religions, but not before the vacation (June). I am for the moment always occupied and troubled. I cannot work during the day-time, al-

way visitors interrupting my reading and writing attempts,  
reports to write for the University and our Academy,  
proof-sheets to revise for friends and answers to give  
to questions addressed to me during half days of research  
in books and notes, etc. etc.

I got your paper on أبي قتيل and can give you an  
additional notice about this bel-aspect. Nagashi  
(lived at the end of the IV and the first quarter of V.  
century) writes in his Kitab al-ridjāt (ed. Bombay)  
A.D. 1917:

عبد الله بن احمد بن حرب بن مظنم بن

The way about Abu Nuwas, as you see, is not mentioned  
here; but on the other side it is interesting to know  
that <sup>A. Haffar</sup> he collated the open voice poem of the father  
of 'Ali.

I have much to do this year with my teaching; but  
that will end in the middle of June. As soon as the  
beginning of May we will all be at home in the same  
place, where we passed the last summer, near the

town. There I hope to can read a bulk of new Oriental  
works ~~postponed~~ for that time, among them the new  
edition of كتاب القالى, which I read about 28 years  
ago for in the Paris Lib. of the work, where I made  
my extracts, which I used in my various works.  
I do not know, what will happen with the American  
Lectures. The "notes" (I think the principal part of  
that book) are ready; the editor will begin to print,  
but I have not the strength and nervous ability to  
plunge me in a very complicated & proof-sheets -  
revision = misery. In the notes, principally in  
the chapters on dogmatism and sects, I give  
many new informations about some specieities  
Would it not be the best, to leave that all as  
a posthumous = work? My drawers are full of  
such papers and materials.

Next week I have to write the article "Bitter"  
illat for Hastings. After having finished with it  
I will put on paper some remarks on theistic  
religious hermeneutics p.e. hellfire; كعب < علي -  
إلا etc. I cannot find in the books on  
Islam any satisfying exposition about these terms.

fundamental in Shi'itic Theology. All our books  
are based on Sunnitic sources, a valuable  
exposition of Shi'itic ideas is lacking.

I do not know what will be the fate of our  
Encyclop. of Islam if we can not get some subven-  
tion from America. You must find out some person  
who could ~~with~~ open the purse of one of the  
American Co-operatives in favour of our work.

It would be a pity if we were forced by lack  
of means to put an end to the whole work  
with the ~~other~~ close of letter A." One can  
not deny that this Encyclopedia is a work which  
fills a gap in our literature. America has more  
interest in Islamic matters as Denmark and  
Belgium.

But now, I suppose, I tormented you enough  
with my English. It is the fourth language I  
used to-day in my correspondence (I wrote an  
Arabic letter also) and you cannot wonder, when  
I write, every language is equal bad news.
