The facsimile of the 'Ansât' of Sam'â'i has now advanced enough to allow comparison with the extracts you gave in 'Zahîritâ' pp 224-7. See two correspond closely, e.g. the readings in your notes (pp 226-7) N.s 2. 3. 4. 6. 7, 10. 11. & 12 are all similar & (p 225. l. 4 a/f) (س) is also there wanting. On that page, l. 7. the B.M. text reads وَابُو الْجَنَاحِ and 227. l. 12 وَابُو الْجَنَاحِ. I hope that you will see the volume early next year, & be able to judge of the similarity.
