



Budapest 14. august 1904

Dear Mr. Macdonald, The present letter is, I think, the last I write to you before leaving Europe in the company of my old friend Prof. Dusse. I do not know ~~the~~ exactly the day of our reaching New York; but I intend to be at St. Louis as early as 17. September. It would be then no possible to comply with your kind invitation to Hartford before the beginning of the Congress. And after the Congress I am bound by the travelling arrangement proposed to the Foreign Speakers. I do not see Hartford in the list of the stations intended for this journey and I cannot hope to enjoy your

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Ken's hospitality. But I will do my best to procure me this pleasure if the use of it could be combined with the general arrangements.

As for the photos, it would be the best to address to one of the Keepers of the Oriental manuscripts in the Bibl. Nation. I do not know, whether Salmon is already returned from Morocco, where he has been sent. Perhaps Mr. Maurice Stewart (keeper of the Hebrew manuscripts), or Casanova (Conservator of Oriental Corino) could help you to the desired photos.
